Happy New Year!!

An outdoorsy family who was thinking of joining had some questions for me contrasting family nature activities versus scouting activities. They asked me one question which I commonly come across, "we already go outside so why go through the trouble of participating in a Scout program when our schedule is already so busy?" Baden-Powell wrote that Scouting is good for the following reasons:

- 1) Providing structure for good Character. Families teach their children right/wrong, but having a Scout Law and Promise helps provide language that youth can understand and use as simple life rules.
- 2) Future Goodwill & Service. Even though it may be easier to go camping with your close friends, going camping with other Scout families whom you do not know is a very important part of the Scouting Method. One of the Scouting goals is to create better leaders for tomorrow. It is by working with DIVERSE families in an exciting environment such as camp, that the youth (and hopefully the adults too) can learn how to work with others so in the future they will be able to help others to promote peace and prosperity.
- 3) Skills. Having a badge system and being outside creates a flexible structure to ensure we are exposed to all sorts of new things to learn.
- 4) Fitness. The meeting and camping schedule motivates us to make sure we go outside, really outside, often.

The Chipmunks made leaf people, the Otters got to practice their knots and read a good book about house building, and the Pack learned about Cubbing and played games.





SCOUT KNOTTY BUG TIME October 2019

Otters read the first chapter of Friends of the Forest. Then they looked at their house pictures. Some scouts drew the outside of their house, some scouts drew the inside, and some scouts drew a view from above.

Otters walked a bit in the woods and then read the book Du Iz Tak. The Otters then made a bug hotel out of a recycled water bottle, some string, and dead twigs and leaves found on the forest ground. The Otters sang the Bug Song to learn the bug body parts. Everyone then made a model of an insect. The Timberwolves practiced their knots and then played games with them. The Yellow Sixer (one of our senior Cubs) ran a scavenger game so they could learn about the 10 Essentials and camping.

SCOUTING IN ALGIERS November 2019




NECKERS & UNIFORMS

WHO ARE WE AND WHAT DO WE DO?

We are the 39th Cypress Group of the Baden-Powell Service Association which has more than fifty Groups in the United States. Our Group currently has four sections: Otters (5-7 year olds), Timberwolves (8-10 years old), Pathfinders (11-18 years old), and Rovers (18+). Unofficially we have Chipmunks (pre-schoolers).

The 39th represents our city's longitude and latitude; roughly 30 degrees north and 90 degrees west.

We chose Cypress as our name because of its importance to our vulnerable coastline and our unique home/habitat.

We are members of the World Federation of Independent Scouts (WFIS); and as such are not in competition with other American Scouting associations, we are their brothers and sisters in Scouting. We work closely with the Baden-Powell Scouts' Association of England and the Baden-Powell Service Association in British Columbia, Canada.

Scouting Is an Outdoor Movement

Scouting is an outdoor movement and that is part of its character. The appeal of true Scouting has always been to that element of the vagabond, pioneer and explorer, which is part of our nature, and most evident in youth. The BPSA focuses on this aspect of the program and encourages our Scouts, parents and volunteers to plan programs that take advantage of being out of doors, whenever and wherever possible.

Scouting as it Was Meant to Be Played

Traditional Scouting is not historical re-enactment, but for the most part an attempt to present Scouting as the game that was played prior to the 1970s; and following principles and practices laid down by Scouting's founder, Robert Baden-Powell. Our aim is to create better citizens by promoting character, fitness, useful skills, and service.

Putting Service before Self

Scouting is a community-oriented experience, in that Scouts provide a function of public and community service. Scouting's aims and methods train the youth to put service before self, whether by participating in community service projects with the group, organizing a public service project with their patrol, or even helping out around their school and home. BPSA's program encourages leaders and volunteers to motivate the Scouts, no matter what section, to give back to the wider community in which they live. Service isn't something done as a requirement for a badge; it's something we do because we're Scouts!

Scouting for Youth and Adults, Boys and Girls

Scouting is one of the best programs for developing character, improving resourcefulness, and learning responsibility and skills in public service; and BPSA believes this program should be available to everyone, youth and adult, regardless of religious beliefs, gender, or sexual orientation.
